## LUTHER AND THE REFORMATION

2017 has been celebrated as the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, which was begun by Catholic monk and scholar Martin Luther in Wittenberg, Germany. In commemoration of this historic development, Rick Steves produced an interesting film that will be shown in the Auditorium at 7:15 p.m. on Tuesday, January 9. Mr. Steves explores the lasting effects of this schism from then-accepted doctrine, resulting in the creation of numerous Protestant churches and, over time, also affecting Catholic doctrine and practices. Along the way, Mr. Steves also provides an interesting travelogue of the historic sites.



At the completion of "Luther" we will turn the lights of the auditorium brighter for about a minute for those who might want to leave, then lights down for another hour with Steves' special "European Christmas". 2017 was a very good year in the library. 3,210 items were checked out, and MOST were returned. Please check in your apartment to see if a library book or DVD has gotten into your personal collection. The highest circulation was in August and the lowest was in December. The 14 day circulation on Fairfax books has been a success. We need to get their books back promptly so that they will continue to offer this service. Their talking book service for the visually challenged continues to

grow. 18 residents volunteer in the library, each with a specific job. The longest serving volunteer is DD Bozak. These volunteers keep the library a useful and pleasant place to enjoy.

## RECYCLING REMINDER

Recycling at GHBC has evolved over the years, based on regulations from Fairfax County and the company, Republic Services, which picks up our recyclable items and our trash. The items we dispose of fall into three basic categories: recyclable items, hazardous waste, and genuine trash. ## NEW RESIDENT SPOTLIGHT

**Georgine and Norman Neureiter** moved to Pointe Apartment 570 from Arlington, on Thursday, December 14. Norm grew up in Geneseo, New York. He has a BA from the University of Rochester (1952) and a PhD in organic chemistry from Northwestern (1957), with one year ('55-'56) spent as a Fulbright Fellow in Germany at the University of Munich. Seeing at first-hand the ravages of war in Europe was “a life-changing experience.” He decided then he wanted a job that would contribute to a better and more peaceful world. In 1963, he left his chemist job at an oil refinery in Texas and joined the National Science Foundation (NSF) in Washington, where he managed a program of science cooperation with Japan. Joining the State Department in 1965, as a Science Attache, he served in Germany and Poland, and in the White House Office of Science and Technology until President Nixon eliminated the office in 1972. Then began a 24-year career at Texas Instruments, which included two years in France and five in Japan, followed by retirement in 1996. In 2000, the State Department appointed him to a three-year term as the first Science and Technology Advisor to the Secretary. That was followed in 2004, by employment with the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) as Director of a new program on Science, Technology and Security Policy. Since 2009, as Senior Advisor at AAAS, he has concentrated on active science diplomacy with special attention to “difficult countries.”

Georgine was raised in suburban Philadelphia, where her father managed a golf course and the family lived in the clubhouse. As a teenager she competed in the first National Junior Girls' Golf Championship. She began at Ursinus College near Philadelphia but soon transferred to Northwestern University, majoring in Speech Education. She graduated from there in 1954, taught in Towson (Maryland) for two years, then resigned to explore Europe. She worked with Radio Free Europe in Munich for two years before returning to teach briefly in Baltimore City. Having met at Northwestern, she and Norm married in 1959 and for their honeymoon traveled to Moscow where Norm was a Russian-speaking guide at the first US-Russian cultural exchange. The family followed Norm's career around the world and in the United States while Georgine managed to raise four children and to work as a travel agent, a caterer and a teacher. In retirement she enjoys gardening, doing Japanese calligraphy, and knitting.

**Betty Taylor** moved into Crossroads apartment 634 from her home in McLean. Betty was born and raised in Roanoke, where she graduated from Jefferson High School in 1941. As there were limited opportunities for women to work or to continue their schooling at that time, she began working in an office and stayed there for the next 20 years. She met and married her husband, who designed highways for the Bureau of Public Roads. The couple lived in Roanoke for 30 years as he worked on the Blue Ridge Parkway. He was then transferred to Northern Virginia where she lived until moving to GHBC.

Betty developed an interest in Ikebana, the Japanese art of flower arranging, and taught this art for 50 years. For the last 25 years she taught summer classes in Highlands, North Carolina.

- The **Fine Arts Committee** will meet on Friday, January 12, at 2:00 p.m. in the Formal Parlor. All are welcome.

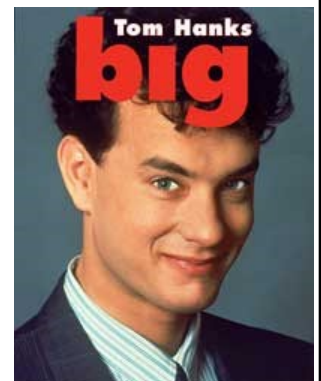
## UPCOMING FILMS
